## 1 GENERAL INFORMATION

#### 1.1 System Overview

The KNXer is intended to establish the connection between IP medium and KNX TP networks. The main purpose is to serve as a Gateway between IP and KNX, providing a secured interface for accessing the KNX installation from devices which only implement IP. It is designed to work with Makel's SmartHome mobile application for Android and IOs as the user interface:

When using Makel's **SmartHome** application the KNXer serves as a centralized configuration server; the project should be defined by using **SmartHomeConfig** application which will load the project into the KNXer; connecting clients will load the configurations from the KNXer. The most up-to-date version on **SmartHomeConfig** is usually found in:

Alternatively to the Makel's **SmartHome** Application, TPC/IP with SSL encryption socket communication protocol is available; also "RESTful like" API is available for more tailored user interface developments.

KNXer is not intended to be a replacement of KNX IP router devices, as it won't apply the routing algorithms from KNX at the same time it is acting as smart home server. It can however be temporarily switched to KNX IP Router.



## 1.2 Makel SmartHome Ecosystem

There's is a comprehensive set of applications and hardware that constitute Makel's SmartHome basic ecosystem:



## 2.1 Functions Overview

The KNXer acts as gateway and simultaneously as a server to various useful services for home and building automation. The key functionalities are:

- KNX <-> IP gateway;
- Access point for Makel's smarthome mobile apps;
- Serves Web User Interface;
- SIP server;
- Centralized task management;
- Centralized alarm management;
- Instant Messaging server;

The KNXer doesn't request from the bus the status every time the mobile apps request, this for decreasing the bus traffic; it keeps in memory the last received status and provides that to the mobile apps. The KNXer will request all the "Read" addresses from the bus just once, when the system first



starts; for avoiding bus saturation due *Read Requests* and *Read Responses* starting colliding, in the first "Read all" the *Read Requests* are placed with a interval between them for giving chance to the answering devices to submit their answers.

## 3 GETTING STARTED

#### 3.1 Connecting for the first time

For first connection a direct connection between KNXer and a PC must be established using a ethernet (RJ45) cable.

1. the PC network settings must be changed to the following settings:

IP	10.X.Y.Z (eg.:10.0.8.84)
Gateway	10.0.0.1
Netmask	255.0.0.0
*Network	10.0.0.0

- Once this settings are changed in the PC connect the ethernet cable between both (PC and KNXer);
- Power up your KNXer by plugging the power cord to the mains and wait around 1 minute for letting the system to boot (follow to the next section <u>3.2</u>);


#### 3.2 Setting up the IP

Ex-factory the device is delivered with a static IP configured: <u>10.0.8.83</u>; This address must be changed to some address suitable to the network in which it will be installed. Normally it is desired to set it to static IP on the LAN, and outside of the DHCP pool<sup>1</sup>. If the IP was previously changed use it instead (in the instruction replace 10.0.8.83 with the current IP).

- 4. In your PC's preferred browser, browse the following link <u>http://10.0.8.83:8081/admin/</u><sup>2</sup>
- 5. A login page is going to be presented:

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> If you have doubts of which IP you should chose, you should look into the network's router and search for the DHCP range (the way of doing this changes from router to router) and select an address outside of this range. <sup>2</sup> The last '/' is important to be written.



6. Once successful logged in, system stats are going to be displayed. Choose the tab for network configurations (see Figure below);

7. In the newly presented page the network settings for the KNXer can be performed. Most the parameters are self explanatory and on-page help is available (see Figure below);

- 8. Once the desired settings are implemented press "Save";
- 9. Next time the system starts the new IP must be active. For confirming it, connect the KNXer to your router (network), power it by plugging the power cord, wait around a minute and try to access its administration page by browsing (in the PC) <u>http://[NEW\_GIVEN\_IP]:8081/admin/</u>;

## 3.3 Project deployment

The setup and deployment of a project is done via **SmartHomeConfig** tool. This tool is provided free of charge (please refer to <u>1.1</u> for details on how to acquire it).

## **4** SMARTHOME CONFIGURATION



#### 4 SMARTHOME CONFIGURATION

In this section it will be described how to set up a new project for a SmartHome application. Keeping in mind that the project modelation is made in two separated steps:

**1st - Project setup in ETS<sup>TM</sup>**.<sup>3</sup> from this step the list of Group Addresses (GAs) and their role will result; these will be the input for the 2ns step;

**2nd - Project setup in SmartHomeConfig:** here the way the GAs and their functions are going to be displayed to the user are configured.

In this section just the **2nd step** is target of study. It's is assumed the person responsible for creating the project as understanding in KNX systems: if terms like "Group Address" and "Data Point Type" are foreign to you, it is highly recommended you to first get education in KNX.

The setup and deployment of a project is done via **SmartHomeConfig** tool. This tool is provided free of charge (please refer to <u>1.1</u> for details on how to acquire it).




Figure X: Relational diagram of SmartHome ecosystem

#### 4.1 Creating a new Database

After opening **SmartHomeConfig**<sup>4</sup> click in "File"-> "Create new Database" (as in the Figure below) and select a location and file name for keeping the project while it is being developed.




Figure 5: Creating a new Database for SmartHome configuration

## 4.2 Creating a KNX link device

A KNX link device is the description of how the KNX is reachable, usually via a KNXer. This serves the purpose of installations where multiple KNXers are installed. As it will be shown ahead, each device has its own KNX link device. In many cases all the devices will share the same KNX link.

- In order to create a KNX Link Device, in the tool menu select "Records"-> "KNX Link Devices";
- 2. In the new appearing form, right click in the empty area and select "New Record";
- 3. Fill the dialog form with the details:

- a. Description: the way KNX link will be identified within the SmartHomeConfig;
- **b. Type:** keep as MINI\_SERVER;
- c. Local Host IP: the IP of the KNXer as set in <u>Setting up the IP</u>;
- d. Local Port: set to 1235; the configured port of the SmartHomeServer;
- e. External IP: the fix external IP or hostname of the network;
- f. External Port: the external port as configured in the port forwarding in the network;
- g. Miniserver username: the username for this KNX link (one of the ones created in Adding users to the project);
- Miniserver user password: the user pass for this KNX link (one of the ones created in <u>Adding users to the project</u>);

## 4.3 Adding locations to the project

A location constitutes normally a building part which commonly includes a set of KNX devices or functions. For example, a living room may include 1 or more lamps, 1 or more thermostats, ...



When planning the user interface it must be defined the topology of the building (or building part) it's wanted to design. The design of the interface accents on the concept that some building part (physical or logical) may be included inside of other building part (physical or logical): for instance, inside of the **living room** (physical area) there may be the **dinning area** (logical) and the **sitting area** (logical); in this case **living room** is parent of **dinning area** and **sitting area**.

In order to create locations, which can contain KNX devices/functions:

- 4. In the toolbar select "Records"-> "Locations and Devices";
- 5. A new form "Locations and Devices" will be displayed, on the empty area right click and select "Add location";
- 6. In the dialog prompt give the name to the location as desired in the textbox **Location Name** to be displayed, and:
  - a. if desired to show the location in the main page of the "locations" menu of the user interface application, let **Parent Location** in its default "Parent Location";

b. if desired to make the location to be inside of other location, set **Parent Location** to the location which shall be its parent;<sup>5</sup>

- c. Repeat for the desired locations, for example, adding "Sitting Area" to the "Living Room";
- 7. Click "Save" and a configuration as in the next picture shall be obtained:

## 4.4 Adding Devices to the project

In the project scope, a "device" is any set of functions that might be logically bounded to a device, for example, a thermostat includes functions as "changing setpoint", "changing HVAC mode", "changing fan speeds", …

A device must be added to a location (please refer to <u>Adding locations to the project</u>). In order to add a device:

- 1. In the toolbar select "Records"-> "Locations and Devices";
- A new form "Locations and Devices" will be displayed, on the empty area right click and select "Add device";
- 3. Fill the presented dialog form with the details of the device is being created:

- a. Device Name: the name of the device as to be shown in the user interface;
- **b. Type:** the type of the device that is being created;
- **c. KNX Link:** the KNX link device used to reach the Group Addresses that control the device (must have been created in <u>Creating a KNX link device</u>);
- d. Current Value: !NOT IN USE! Let it blank (For future purpose);
- e. Parameters: depending on the type of the device selected has different meanings;
- **f.** Locations: here it can be selected under which locations the device must be displayed when using the user interface;
- **g. Group Addresses:** in this table, depending on the device type selected, a set of "Address Type" will be displayed with the fields "Read" and "Write" to be filled; in the "Read" parameter one must insert the Group address from which the feedback of



the "Address Type" can be obtained (if applicable); in the "Write" parameter on must insert the Group Address that controls the "Address Type" (if applicable);

- 4. Repeat for the desired devices functions;
- 5. Click "Save & Quit";

## 4.5 Configuring user interface visible menus

It's possible to define which menus are visible for a certain user (database). This can be done by, in the toolbar selecting "Records"-> "Main Menu Links". The following dialog form shall be presented:

In this form select which menus are going to be visible or not by activating/deactivating the checkbox in the "Active" column.

## 4.6 Adding users to the project

It is possible to have multiple users in the same KNXer. This can be used, for example, to give different users control access to different KNX functions or devices; in an office, for example, one may want the user of a room to have control of elements belonging just to that room. For each user a database must be created, just as described in the previous subsections.

To add users "File"-> "Miniserver Users" and the following form must be displayed.

**NOTE**: If Users were previously added to the Miniserver, first **Get Users From Miniserver** must be pressed.

There are three passwords that must be configured, each of them to be used in different interfaces:

- **DB Password:** The password for accessing the user's database (when using mobile app);
- Web Password: The password for accessing the user's corresponding Web interface;
- **Config Password:** The user's password to be used when accessing the "admin" page<sup>6</sup>;

It must be noticed that a user to be activated needs to be set in the respective check box, as demonstrated in the Figure above.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>6</sup> The user's available content on the admin's page is more limited that the one available when logged in with "root".



Once all the users (or the user) has been defined, the IP of the KNXer must be inserted in the **Miniserver IP** box<sup>7</sup>. The process is finished by pressing **Upload Users to Miniserver**; the success is confirmed with a dialog box.

## 4.7 Setting up scenarios

Scenarios affects a group of KNX functions (or devices) in order to set an predefined state. Very often users wish to set a specific state, for instance for movie watching, where certain lamps shall be turned off and/or set to a specific level of brightness. Scenarios are built in in KNX protocol and most devices support them. Makel's solution allow those built in scenarios to be mapped into the user's interface.

It may happen that some devices don't support association with scenarios for certain functions; for covering this case SmartHome ecosystem allows to create "virtual scenarios". "Virtual scenario" will concatenate a series of commands/KNX messages to the desired GAs in order to perform the desired state. The drawback of this method is that if there are many GAs involved in the realization of the scenario there will occur a bus traffic increase and between first message and last message there will be a time difference directly related with the number of messages that have to be sent.

For creating scenarios from the toolbar select "Records"-> "Scenarios".

NOTE: for the scenarios to be visible the "Scenarios" menu must be enabled (see <u>Configuring user</u> interface visible menus);

#### 4.7.1 KNX Scenarios

First lets cover the KNX built in scenarios. The scenario state shall have been defined during the ETS project's configuration.

- From the dialog form "Scenarios and Devices Relations", in the "Scenario" area click in "New";
- 2. Fill the parameters as in the following picture:
  - **a.** Name: the name as to be displayed in the user interface;
  - **b.** KNX Scenario: activating this checkbox allows to create KNX built in scenarios;
  - c. Scenario Index: the scenario index as configured in ETS;

#### 4.7.2 "Virtual" scenarios

The "Virtual" scenarios setup is somewhat different as it is necessary to configure the state to be established upon scenario activation.

- 1. From the dialog form "Scenarios and Devices Relations", in the "Scenario" area click in "New";
- 2. Fill the "Scenario Name" and make sure the "KNX Scenario" checkbox isn't checked;
- 3. From the dialog form "Scenarios and Devices Relations", in the "Devices associated with the selected scenario" area click in "New";
- 4. Fill the parameters on the "Device-Scenario Relation" newly appeared dialog form:
  - a. Scenario: the scenario that will trigger sending KNX commands;
  - **b.** Device: the device/KNX function that is intended to be affected by the scenario;



- **c.** Parameters: the value that is to be set to the device selected (click on the information symbol for more information about the "Parameters");
- 5. Repeat from step  $\underline{3}$  for all the devices that shall be affected by the scenario;

#### 4.8 Setting Up IP cameras

Makel's SmartHome mobile applications allow to access to IP cameras' streams. Normally IP cameras provide streams via URL. Each camera has its own format, so please refer to your IP camera manufacturer for further details on how to access IP camera's video stream.

For the cameras to be accessible the cameras menu must be activated in <u>Configuring user interface</u> <u>visible menus</u>.

In order to setup an IP camera:

- 1. From the toolbar "Records"-> "Cameras";
- 2. In the dialog form "Cameras" click in "Add";
- 3. Modify the newly created entry with your camera's details:



- **a. Description:** the camera's description as to be displayed in the user interface;
- Local Link: the URL that allows to access the camera's stream when inside the LAN (Local Area Network);
- **c.** External Link: the URL that allows to access the camera's stream when outside the LAN (Local Area Network) (when in the Wide Area Network WAN);<sup>8</sup>

## 4.9 Configuring Alarms<sup>9</sup>

It is possible to setup alarms. Alarms allows the users to get notified when a predetermined condition on the KNX bus is verified; for example, when the GA 1/2/3 received the value "On" the users may be notified via mobile SmartHome applications.

Alarms can also be set from within the SmartHome mobile Apps, but for that the "Alarms" menu shall be activated from <u>Configuring user interface visible menus</u>.

From the SmartHomeConf application:

- 1. From the toolbar "Records"-> "Alarms";
- 2. In the empty area right click and select "New";
- 3. Fill the parameters from the presented "Edit Alarm" dialog form:
  - **a. Description:** the description as to be displayed to the user;
  - **b.** Alarm Group address: the GA that will trigger the alarm;

- **c.** Alarm Group address value: the value of the message on the GA that will trigger the alarm<sup>10</sup>;
- d. Is Enabled: en the checkbox is checked the alarm is active; deactive otherwise;
- e. This alarm is for door bell: when checked, when the alarm condition is met, a door bell sound is played from the mobile application;
- **f. Enable vibration:** when checked, when the alarm condition is met, the mobile device will vibrate (if vibration available);
- **g.** Enable notification: when checked, when the alarm condition is met, the alarm will appear as an application notification;
- **h.** Enable continuous Alarm: when checked, when the alarm condition is met, the alarm sound will continuous play until it's manually closed, otherwise it will play just once;

## 4.11 Project deployment to KNXer

Once all the previous subsections have been completed, in order to deploy the project, the created database shall be uploaded to the KNXer, from where afterwards the users will be able to access either with mobile app or via the web interface served by the KNXer itself.



- In order to upload the database to the KNXer from the toolbar click "File"-> "Upload Database to Miniserver";
- 2. Fill the parameter in the newly presented dialog form (take the picture below as reference):

- a. Mini Server IP: the IP given to the KNXer (<u>Setting up the IP</u>);
- **b. Port:** set as 1235;
- c. Database File: path to the database to be uploaded (<u>Creating a new Database</u>);
- **d.** Username: the username that will be associated with the database to be uploaded (Adding users to the project);
- 3. Press "Upload" button and wait the transfer bar to reach 100% and the success message to be displayed.



# 5 USER INTERFACE ACCESS



#### 5 USER INTERFACE ACCESS

There are currently three ways of reaching a user interface that allows to control the KNX installation through the KNXer:

- Web interface;
- Mobile application:
  - Android;
  - IOS;

It is assumed that the **SMARTHOME CONFIGURATION** has been studied and executed.

#### 5.1 Web interface

The web interface can be accessed from a browser by writing on the URL bar the KNXer's IP followed by its port number, pointing to the "web" folder of its server; something on this shape: http://10.0.0.223:8081/web/ where the IP 10.0.0.223 must be replaced with the IP selected (see <u>Setting</u> up the IP). This shall bring a login page as in the following figure:

Enter the user credentials as created in <u>Adding users to the project</u>. Once the login is successful the user is prompted with the main menu of the user application were the menus enabled in <u>Configuring</u> <u>user interface visible menus</u> will be shown<sup>11</sup>. 


Figure X: Example of web main menu




Figure X: Android first run screen

Mini Server's IP Address: the IP address given to the KNXer (as set in <u>Setting up</u> <u>the IP</u>)<sup>12</sup>; Note that if the download is being performed from outside of the Local Area Network (over the internet) this field shall contain the external IP or the hostname of the installation;
- **b. TCP Port:** let 1235 if in Local Area Network; if the download is being performed from outside of the Local Area Network (over the internet) this field shall contain the external port as configured in the router to be forward to the port 1235 of the KNXer;
- 3. Press "Download" and wait for the success message.




Figure X: IOs SmartHome App first screen

#### 6 KNXER ADVANCED CONFIGURATIONS

When accessing the configurations page by browsing <u>http://10.0.0.223:8081/admin/</u><sup>13</sup> the login is possible in different levels of permissions:

- <u>User:</u> provides access to very limited configurations, mostly access to some systems status and the possibility to change access passwords (for the user itself);
- <u>Project administrator:</u> provides access to more advanced parameters that might affect the experience of all users of the KNXer;

## 6.1 All users level settings

This becomes available just after a user is created (see <u>Adding users to the project</u>). In the login page the *username* and *password* as set in the user creation for the *web* fields. The settings/information available in this section is also available for the administrator (account root).

In the previous figure:

- **Date time:** the date and time retrieved from the KNXer. By clicking in "ntpd settings" date and time configurations page will be presented (not available for user, just admin);
- **Computer clock:** the date and time of the local machine (the device from where the configurations page is being browsed), serves the purpose of easily comparing the KNXer date and time with the local machine.
- Up time: the amount of time since the KNXer's previous boot;
- MAC Address: the physical address of the network interface of the KNXer;
- [SERVICE\_NAME] Service: gives the status of the service;
  - KNXD Service Status: by clicking "Activate" the Knxer Service and KnxHomeServer Service are stopped and the KNXD<sup>14</sup> service is started;<sup>15</sup> after this it shall be possible to find with ETS an IP-Router implemented by the KNXer. IMPORTANT: when the KNXD service is enabled the SmartHome applications won't be able to connect. KNXD is not intended to be activated permanently. Use it only for maintenance with ETS.
- **KNXer image version:** informs which is the version of the installation setup running on the KNXer;
- Linux version: once clicked in "show info" the Linux distribution details are outputted;
- Java version: once clicked in "show info" the Java version currently installed is displayed;

#### 6.1.2 System page

By clicking in "System" on the top tabs the following page shall be displayed. In this page the currently logged in user's passwords may be changed.

#### 6.2.2 Updates configuration page

When the "Updates" tab is selected the page on the following figure shall be presented. In this configuration page is possible to check for updates related with the running services on the KNXer. Makel provides OTA updates that can be set<sup>16</sup> to automatic; everytime bugfixes occur or major features modifications happen the applications are put online for the KNXers to download and self update for improved user experience.

If the automatic updates are preferable they can be disabled and run manually when desired. Additionally one may force a certain application to be fetched from the Makel's servers and fresh installed.

- **Disable automatic update:** by checking the checkbox the KNXer won't automatically connect to Makel's servers enquiring for updated versions of the applications/services;
- Update period: sets when the KNXer shall look for updates; it is recommended to set for a period in which the installation is normally unused as the update may result in temporary non-operation of the smarthome application;
- Manual update: when "Check Now and Update" is pressed the KNXer will connect to Makel's servers looking for updates; if any of the "Force update ..." is checked, then that service will be downloaded from the servers and re-installed on the KNXer;
- Update Logs: in this output window the result of the manual update is displayed.



#### 6.2.3 Parameters configuration page

Some of the KNX related configurations reside in the "Parameters" configuration page. Things like KNX individual address and broadcast settings may be set in this page. Once the tab "Parameters" is pressed a page similar to the one presented in the following picture shall be presented:

- **Device name:** the name to be displayed when the "mini server search" is used; in the resulting list this name is going to shown together with its IP number;
- **KNX ind. address:** the KNX individual address to set for the KNXer; this is important to be a different address from the others set to the remaining devices on the project;
- KNX date-time Synchronization: allows to enable the KNXer to send the "Date and Time" to the KNX bus in order to feed KNX devices that need a precise clock source; the value is sent in the KNX standard data format (19.001 PDT\_DATE\_TIME); when the KNXer is granted internet access it uses NTPD servers for keeping the clock synchronization;
  - **Period:** it is possible to define how often the clock shall be issued to the bus;
  - Group Address: sets the GA to which the "Date and Time" shall be sent;



- Database HASH control: when active, upon user authentication, the KNXer is going to evaluate not only the user credentials, but also will evaluate if the user being authenticated owns a valid version of the configuration database; this option is recommended to be activated as it keeps away intruders that in some sort got access to some user credentials;
- **Broadcast settings:** it is possible to establish connections between different KNXers; this is implemented by allowing to define with who each KNXer connects; the rules get effective just if the "Activate" checkbox is checked when the "Save broadcast settings" is pressed:
  - **Outbound:** 
    - <u>IP</u>: the IP of the partner KNXer that shall receive the messages sent; if all the KNXers are to receive the messages then this field shall be filled with the network's broadcast address (usually 255.255.255.255);
    - <u>Port:</u> the port number that the partner (or partners) is listening;
    - <u>Group Address filter:</u> the messages being outbounded (sent to the partners) can be filtered by their GAs; wildcards apply:
      - "\*" = any; eg.: 1/2/\* means: any GA started by 1/2 (main group address 1, middle group address 2 and any group address);
      - "[x-b]", where 'a' and 'b' are digits = from 'a' to 'b'; eg.: 1/2/[0-10] means: any GA in the range 1/2/0 to 1/2/10;
    - <u>Message type filter</u>: it is also possible to filter messages by it's communication type: read requests, write requests and feedbacks;
    - <u>KNX Area</u>: should be a unique number for each KNXer. KNXer will discard the messages received from the same KNX area.
  - Inbound:
    - <u>IP</u>: the IP of the partner KNXer that will be sending the messages; if all the KNXers are to be accepted then this field shall be filled 0.0.0.0;
    - <u>Port:</u> the port number that the partner (or partners) will use for broadcast;
    - <u>Group Address filter</u>: the messages being received (sent by the partners) can be filtered by their GAs; wildcards apply:
      - "\*" = any; eg.: 1/2/\* means: any GA started by 1/2 (main group address 1, middle group address 2 and any group address);
      - "[x-b]", where 'a' and 'b' are digits = from 'a' to 'b'; eg.: 1/2/[0-10] means: any GA in the range 1/2/0 to 1/2/10;



In the configuration process using SmartHomeConfig application, when creating devices, the device type being created must be choose from the list of available devices types<sup>17</sup>.

## 7.1 Dimmer - Lighting

"Dimmer - Lighting" device provides a control that allows the user to adjust the lightning brightness intensitivity from 0% to 100%. Dimmers (for KNX installations) most commonly support brightness adjustment via DPT5.001 (DPT\_Scaling) and control via DPT 1.001 (DPT\_Switch); also most commonly they provide separated feedbacks of them current status for those two variables.

Feedbacks received from the bus will set the slider position to the received value; interaction on the slider results on sending the slider position value to the bus.

"Shutter and Blinds" enable the user to interact with Shutter and Blinds actuators. Most Shutter and Blinds actuators provide means to control the position in the following ways:

- 1. Up or Down movement started by DPT 1.008 (DPT\_UpDown), and movement stopped by DPT1.010 (DPT Start);
- 2. By sending an absolute position via DPT5.001 (DPT\_Scaling);

The position of the Shutter is most commonly provided via DPT5.001 (DPT\_Scaling). Feedbacks received from the bus will set the slider position to the received value; interaction on the slider results on sending the slider position value to the bus.

  - **Read:** !NOT USED! if filled reproduces no effect;
  - Write: the GA used to send the Start/Stop commands;
- UP DOWN:
  - **Read:** !NOT USED! if filled reproduces no effect;



- Write: the GA used to send the Up/Down commands;
- DIM:
  - **Read:** the GA from where the current absolute position is received (in percentage DPT5.001 Scaling);
  - Write: the GA used to send the absolute position selected on the slider;

"Multimeter" provides the user to observe Voltage (V) and Current (A) values. The information provider devices, commonly multimeters or energy meters, provide voltages in DPT9.020 (DPT\_Volt) and currents in DPT9.021 (DPT\_Curr); at most an installation may have three phases (R, S and T).

"Thermostat" enables the users to monitor and control the HVAC units installed (when KNX interface is available. The common controls of HVAC systems are:

- <u>HVAC mode:</u> DPT20.102 (DPT\_HVAC\_Mode);
- <u>Heating/Cooling mode:</u> DPT1.100 (DPT\_Heat/Cool);
- <u>Setpoint temperature:</u> DPT9.001 (DPT\_Value\_Temp);
- <u>Fan Speed:</u> most commonly controlled via separated 1bit COs;

- Environment Temp FB:
  - **Read:** the GA from where the KNXer will be receiving the information of the environment temperature; normally there must be a KNX thermostat that senses the room temperature and sends it to the bus (to a GA) with some peridiocity or upon certain variation of temperature;
  - Write: !NOT USED! if filled reproduces no effect;
- **BASE Temp:** the base temperature is available in some of the KNX Room Temperatures controllers, as it is the case of Makel's MTHxxxx-yL series; the base temperature defines the threshold for automatic switchover between Heating and Cooling<sup>19</sup>;
  - **Read:** from where the feedback will be received;
  - Write: to where will the KNXer write the new base setpoint;

- **SETPOINT Temp:** shall the active setpoint GA;
  - **Read:** GA from where the feedback of the currently active setpoint;
  - Write: the GA to where new septoint selection shall be sent;
- HVAC Mode:
  - **Read:** the GA from where KNXer receives feedback from the HVAC mode currently active;
  - Write: the GA to where KNXer shall send new selections of HVAC modes to be activated;
- SETPOINT Temp STEP:
  - **Read:** !NOT USED! if filled reproduces no effect;
  - Write: the GA to be used by KNXer to send step Up/Down commands to the currently active setpoint;
- BASE Temp STEP:
  - **Read:** !NOT USED! if filled reproduces no effect;
  - Write: the GA to be used by KNXer to send step Up/Down commands to the base temperature setpoint;
- Fan Mode: controls if the fan works in Manual or Automatic mode;
  - **Read:** the GA from where KNXer will get the active mode (Man/Auto) of the fan;
  - Write: the GA to be used to select the fan operating mode (Man/Auto);
- Fan Step: when the fan mode is in manual allows to control the fan speed by stepping Up/Down;
  - **Read:** !NOT USED! if filled reproduces no effect;

- Fan Percentage: some of the Room Temperature controllers allow to control the fan in a continuous way (for fans that are usually DC powered);

  - Write: the GA that KNXer will use to set the desired fan speed (usually requires fan manual mode activation);
- **ON-OFF State:** this is used only to provide feedback to the user about the operation (active/passive) status of the controller;
  - **Read:** the GA from where the KNXer will get the information of the status of the controller (if the heater/cooler is currently heating/cooling);
  - Write: !NOT USED! if filled reproduces no effect;



## 7.6 Remote Control




Figure X: Android "Remote Control" control example

"Remote Control" provides interface for the users to interact with KNX<->IR converters. Most commonly this converters require one GA per IR command and the GA message is 1bit trigger for the KNX<->IR to issue the IR command.




Figure X: Android "On Off - General" control examples



"On Off - General" controls are intended for the user to use to control generic On/Off type loads. This controls only allow to control DPT1.xxx and DPT2.xxx GAs. The way the symbol is display is defined in the "Parameters" field of the device creation form.

- **PRIORITY:** it is common to have loads/lights which provides an "override" or "priority" CO; this COs are 2bit and from DPT2.xxx;
  - **Read:** the GA from where the KNXer will get the information of the override status of the load;
  - Write: the GA that the KNXer will use to send the "override"/"priority" commands;

## 7.8 Presence Detector

"Presence Detector" control allows the user to monitor and control presence detectors (with light regulation, if available).

#### 7.8.1 Parameters

Allows to configure minimum and maximum lux values which can be set by user. For configuring the symbol click on "edit" by the textbox of the "Parameters" input and select from the available settings. Default values for the minimum and maximum lux values are 0 and 1000.

- LUX\_SP: the light intensity setpoint (in lux);
  - **Read:** the GA from where the KNXer will be receiving the currently set setpoint for the light intensity;

- **CURR\_LUX:** the currently measured light intensity (in lux);
  - **Read:** the GA from where the KNXer will obtain the currently measured light intensity of the environment;
  - Write: !NOT USED! if filled reproduces no effect;
- **MODE\_PRESENCE:** the presence mode (present/absent);
  - **Read:** the GA from where the KNXer will be receiving the feedback of that presence status;
  - Write: (when in manual) the GA to where the KNXer will send the presence/absence command;
- AUTO\_MAN: many presence detectors that also controls lights automatically, provide means to switch to manual lights control;
  - **Read:** from where the KNXer will get the currently active lights control mode;
  - Write: to where the KNXer will send the user's input for the lights control mode;
